George, Eli, Caleb,Sam and Isabelle from Room 8 have been into other Senior School classrooms this week teaching other students. As well as learning how to weave, students are learning the tikanga around using harakeke. I asked some students from Room 8 about tikanga and they told me when cutting









harakeke, you don't take it when it is raining or when it is dark and you always say a karakia after cutting it. Here are some photos of Caleb, Sam, Eli, George and Isabelle teaching Room 6 how to make kono. Room 5 was also taught by Room 8 students and here is Harry with his almost completed kono. Harry told me he really liked learning about Matariki, making his Kono and kono are good for holding things like fruit and vegetables.

Thank you to the group of lovely parents who made the staff morning tea and it was absolutely delicious and much appreciated by the staff. I'm sure some of New Menu Item the recipes will appear in the great Waterlea Village Cookbook coming soon to a school near you so watch this space!

We wish our tamariki, whanau and staff a lovely break after an unusual start to our school year.
