### Facts for kids.

Sharks that visit the Manukau Harbour include small school sharks and dogfish. In summer, hammerheads can be seen basking on the surface. Great White Sharks are known to visit the waters and Mako sharks have been seen swimming inside the harbour mouth. Dolphins and stingrays are also regularly seen in the Manukau Harbour.





Godwits make the remarkable journey from its Alaskan breeding grounds to the Manukau Harbour in one continuous 11,000km flight across the Pacific, a journey of eight to ten days without sleep or feeding. Absolutely remarkable!!

In the Manukau Harbour there are scallops, oysters, giant horse mussels, cockles and pipi.

The Manukau Harbour is 394 square kilometres,

which is about half the size of New York City.
