Welcome to Week 4 of Term 1. I hope you are enjoying the sunshine and the lovely longer days while they last. Now that we have been back at school for a few weeks, we thought it would be a good time to discuss some educational issues that you would've heard about in the news and how they might impact what we do at Waterlea School.



The first issue you might have heard about is a requirement to ensure our tamariki have one hour a day each of reading, writing and maths. At Waterlea School, we've always known the value of allocating a good chunk of time every day to these three learning areas and our school/class timetable reflects this priority. We also understand the need to be flexible and practical when considering how children learn best. Alongside teaching reading, writing and maths, we ensure our tamariki have a rich, broad curriculum with learning activities and experiences which can lay the foundation for ongoing progress in numeracy and literacy. Rich learning activities include health and physical activities, art, dance and drama, science and technology, and learning about the history of our local whenua. Since returning to school this year our tamariki have already experienced some of these rich experiences.

Last week the Year 4 team visited the Maritime Museum where they learnt about early migration and Pacific exploration.





The younger children in Year 2 have a scheduled time each week where they visit Waterlea Park for their Forest School. Here they have an opportunity to collaboratively problem solve and develop oral language skills. The Year 1 tamariki will visit the park for their Manaakitanga Morning where they will be learning and developing social, communication and self management skills. These skills not only underpin our MANA values, promoting positive behaviour and hauora/wellbeing, but are essential for successful learning through play activities.

These planned activities that come from a rich curriculum are also important because they provide springboards for further learning in reading, writing and maths due to our tamariki's level of engagement, curiosity and ownership.









## Phones away for the day



The second issue that has been in the news is that schools need to ensure students do not use or access a personal phone while they are at school. This includes during lunchtimes, breaks and after school while they are on the school grounds. Again, this is not such an issue for us at Waterlea because our policy regarding personal phones has reflected this already. If a student has a phone at school it is dropped off at the school office before school and picked up again at 3pm. The Year 5 and 6 team has a parent/child agreement regarding this which has been sent out so look out for it and ask your classroom teacher if you require further information.

## Year 1 and 2 Whaanau Workshop

If you have children in Year 1 and 2 you would've had an invitation to a workshop after school tomorrow. The workshop is facilitated by the Junior School Team and will explore the Structured Literacy approach to teaching and learning literacy. The workshop will be held in the school hall at 3.15pm and your children will be supervised.
