# Goat Island Trip

On the 21st of March, Rm 5, Rm 6, and half of Rm 9 went to Goat Island to learn about different Marine Reserves, and to snorkel in the ocean.

Fun fact: Did you know that Goat Island was the first ever marine reserve in New Zealand?

We had to get to school by 7:00, so I woke up at 6:30 and it was super dark outside! When I got to school all of the teachers going to Goat Island were outside checking off every kid that came that morning. Once we had done the roll and everybody had gone to the toilet, we walked down to two big buses outside of our school and loaded everyone's bags in the lower compartment of the bus. We hopped on the bus and started our 2 hour and 30 minute drive to Goat Island! Some people started to doze off considering that it was still very early in the morning, but some people started to sing our school Karakia and it woke everybody up.

Finally, we had made it to Goat Island and everybody was so stiff from sitting down all morning so we stretched our legs by walking down to a gazebo where we had a snack and drink of water. Then we started our briefing with Sophie (our instructor). She stated some standard housekeeping rules like where the bathroom is, and when the groups will be doing their activities. After the briefing with Sophie, group 1 went off to do their snorkelling, group 2 (my group) walked down to the stream for the "stream study" and group 3 went down to the rock pools. We looked in the stream to see what we could find and we saw a fresh-water crayfish. It was so cool! We looked around in the water and also saw some mosquito fish as well! Afterwards we went to clarify the water and it was a bit muddy but mostly clear and had a number of six for its cleanliness.

Before long it was time to get ready for.... snorkelling! We headed up to the main area to get our snorkelling gear: wetsuits, snorkels, and flippers. I was buddies with my close friend Samara and my mum, Louise. With all of gear, everybody walked down to the shore where we got our body boards and walked along the rocks plus sitting down to put our flippers and snorkels on before walking in salty seawater and starting to swim out into depths of the water around about 5 minutes in the snorkel session we saw a real life stingray! It looked so calm, and I was surprised it wasn't scared of all of the excited kids around. My group saw a lot of Snapper and Red moki! The snapper was so beautiful! With its blue, grey, and purple colour! We snorkelled some more and saw lots of kina and kelp. When the snorkel session was over and we walked exhaustedly to the gazebos before getting into our dry clothes and having some lunch n

Our last activity, investigation of the rock pools! We walked our some large rocks before arriving at the small rock pools. We saw some blow holes spraying water! It was so magical as I watched the sun glisten through the water as it sprayed high into the sky. We made a note of the different types of freshwater fish we could see! And the water was so clear that I thought it was glass.

We all came back together to share what we saw. I saw some tiny fish, oyster shells , and mussels. Then we started to head back up to home base where the gazebos were.

Group 1 and 3 came back and we had a debrief with Sophie, to share what our favourite thing was.

Sadly, it was time we said goodbye to Goat island so we said goodbye to Sophie, Callum , and Becky before loading our bags onto the bus and getting on and starting another 2 hour and 30 minute drive to Mangere Bridge. I felt sad because we were leaving but I knew that I would definitely come back to Goat island to swim in the water. The bus ride back was very quiet because everybody was so drained from the day's events, and I fell asleep for about 30 minutes before waking up to the sound of my friends laughing.

We got back to school around 4:30-5:00 and were greeted by the sun beaming into everybody's eyes and we were also greeted by the smiling faces of all the kids' parents, As the kids hugged their parents before driving home.

And that was the end of our spectacular adventure at Goat Island!

# Goat Island trip.

Last Thursday on the 21 of March room 5,6 and half of room 9 went to Goat island by bus. We are learning about the Marine Reserve and environment, and we also did some snorkelling in the Marine Reserve, plus there were other interesting activities for us to do!

We had to wake up really early and get to school between 7 - 7.15am. Due to bad traffic the bus had to leave at 7.30. I woke up at around 6am and managed to get to school before the bus left for Goat island. We lined up while the teacher said some safety stuff, and then we hopped on the bus. It was quite a long drive, the bus ride was around 2 hours. The bus was really comfy, there were curtains, seatbelts, and reclining chairs.

Once we arrived at Goat island, we sat down under the gazebo. One of the instructors (her name is Sophie) gave us a safety briefing and other important information. We had a little snack, and then we got ready for our first activity. Group 1 was snorkelling first, group 2 had the stream study first, and group 3 was exploring the rock pools. We got changed into our togs, and put wetsuits on. We got a snorkel, mask, and flippers, then we lined up and walked to the shore. We had to have a buddy and an adult to share the bodyboard with. My buddy was Emily. Sophie taught us how to use the snorkel and mask, and then told us some important information on snorkelling and safety stuff for when we are in the sea. Then we went into the water. We had to walk backwards when we were wearing flippers because if we walked casually in flippers, then we might fall over, or the flippers might break. Once we got into the water we started snorkelling. We saw a lot of fish like: snapper, crayfish, kina (sea urchin), kelp, seaweed, red moki etc. We even saw a stingray. Snorkelling was really fun and I hope I get to do it again. After snorkelling, we got ready for our next activity.

We walked down to the rock pools and started exploring. We found things like: crabs, shrimp, sea snails, mussels, oyster, small fish, kina, and starfish. We were exploring the rock pools, and trying to find a lot of interesting stuff. There were a lot of rocks and slippery green stuff, so we had to be careful. I walked around the rock pools and the beach, and I also found a small waterfall. Then when we finished we walked back to the gazebo and had some lunch.

The last thing we did was the stream study. We walked through the bush and reached the stream where our last activity took place. We sat down by the stream and listened to one of the instructors, Callum. He told us to listen to the noises surrounding us, and then tell him what we heard. We heard birds chirping, cicadas, other insects, and the leaves rustling in the wind. Then we got out some big tubes, which was for testing the water clarity. After that, Callum scooped some water from the streams into the buckets and we looked at the tiny fish living in them. We found small sea worms, shrimp, and a baby crayfish. Once we finished we walked back and packed our things, and went into the bus.

I had an amazing time at Goat Island, snorkelling with the fish, looking at the rock pools, and spending time with my friends!


