At Waterlea School, the MANA Values Korowai is a significant award presented to a student each term who consistently and outstandingly demonstrates the school's four core values:

Manaakitanga: Being kind, caring, and supportive.

<u>Aumangea</u>: Being persistent, resilient, and brave.

Ngaakau Pono: Being respectful, honest, and having integrity.

Ako: Learning, teaching, and seeking new knowledge.

The korowai itself is a beautiful taonga made by Whaea Angelique, and it tells the story of the local area. Its presentation is a highlight of the regular MANA Values assemblies held by the school. Students are nominated by their teachers for showing these values across all aspects of school life, serving as role models for their peers. This tradition reinforces the school's commitment to its values, which were developed through community consultation and form the foundation of Waterlea's school-wide culture. Last term we chose Jiya Pillay from the Senior School to receive this significant award and please read on to see why Jiya was chosen. We acknowledge Jiya and her whaanau for her outstanding contribution of leadership to Waterlea School.

Next Week is Samoan Language Week, 2-6 June

Waterlea School embraces Samoan Language Week - it is an opportunity for our Samoan tamariki to shine and share their language and culture with others. Here's a look at what Samoan Language Week often looks like at Waterlea School:

- Samoan tamariki are encouraged to dress in their traditional Samoan clothing for the week; often tamariki
 wear items of clothing which are taonga in their whaanau and they have an opportunity to share this with
 their kaiako and classmates; they become the experts in their classrooms sharing stories reflecting Samoan
 language and culture.
- Throughout the week, classrooms engage in various activities to learn more about Samoan language and culture. This can include:
 - Learning and practicing Samoan greetings, phrases, and simple conversations.
 - Exploring traditional Samoan art forms like Siapo (tapa cloth), with students creating their own designs using various materials.
 - Learning and performing traditional Samoan dances, such as the Sasa.
 - Discovering Samoan traditional stories.
 - Learning about the geography, history, and unique culture of Samoa.
 - Sometimes whaanau bring in traditional kai for their child's classmates
- Often our older students perform traditional Samoan dance for other classes and then perform at the Samoan Language Week, MANA assembly.
- Reinforcing School Values: The celebration of Samoan Language Week aligns with Waterlea School's broader commitment to fostering pride in students' identity, language, and culture.


