

The 2025 theme for Samoa Language
Week is 'la malu lou sā. Folau i lagimā – A
well-grounded self, is a successful self'. In
other words, people who prepare
thoroughly and with intention become
grounded and resilient and well-equipped
to navigate life's challenges and succeed
in their endeavours. No matter the
challenges and hardships of life, a
well-grounded person will not be easily
shaken or defeated because they are
firmly rooted and well-prepared.













# Reading and speaking Gagana Samoa

The core Samoan alphabet is comprised of 14 letters:

The consonants (konesane):

F, G, L, M, N, P, S, T and V

The vowels (vaueli): **A, E, I, O** and **U** (as in the English

language: are, there, three, or, too).
These vowels have the same

pronunciation as other Pacific languages, including te reo Māori (Māori language).

The letters  ${\bf K}$ ,  ${\bf H}$  and  ${\bf R}$  are also used, but usually for foreign loanwords and/ or for colloquial language. Vowels can be long or short.

Long vowels are marked with a macron (e.g. ā).

ā, ē, ī, ō, ū

(as in the English language: father, egg, feet, thought, loot)

It is important that the short and long vowel sounds are used, as they distinguish between different words e.g. ava (respect) verses āvā (wife).

The glottal stop (\*) is also used in Samoan and is treated as a consonant. It creates a pause between two vowels or creates a sharper sound when used at the start of a word, as the sound made in the English word uh-oh. Using the glottal stop, distinguishes different words such as fa'i (banana) and fai (to do), or 'ulu (breadfruit) and ulu (head).

# Matariki at Waterlea School

At Waterlea School, Matariki is a deeply valued and eagerly anticipated event that brings our entire school community together to celebrate the Maaori New Year. Our celebrations are rooted in the rich traditions and meanings of Matariki, fostering a sense of connection, remembrance, celebration, and looking forward to the future.

Here's how we typically celebrate Matariki at Waterlea School:

### 1. Dawn Hikoi to Te Pane o Mataoho (Māngere Mountain):

- A significant and cherished part of our Matariki celebration is the **dawn hikoi** up our local maunga, Te Pane o Mataoho (Maangere Mountain).
- This early morning journey allows students, staff, and whaanau to experience the stillness and beauty of the dawn, traditionally a key time to observe the Matariki star cluster rising in the sky.
- It provides a powerful opportunity for reflection, to remember those who have passed on (Pōhutukawa star), and to connect with the whenua (land).
- We encourage families to join us for this special, symbolic start to our celebrations.

### 2. Community Breakfast:

• Following the dawn hikoi and/or the Matariki Assembly, we often host a **shared breakfast** at school. This embodies the Matariki principle of gathering together (Matariki Ahunga Nui) and sharing kai (food). It's a wonderful opportunity for our whānau to connect and share in the festivities.

### 3. Matariki MANA Assembly and Performances:

- We hold a special Matariki MANA Assembly where the whole school comes together.
- This assembly is a vibrant celebration of Maaori culture, often featuring:
  - Waiata related to Matariki.
  - **Kapa Haka performances** by our students, showcasing their learning and pride in Maaori performing arts.
  - **Storytelling** about the significance of Matariki, the nine stars of the cluster, and local Maaori legends.
  - Presentations of learning about Matariki from different classes.

### 4. Classroom Learning and Activities:

- Leading up to the main celebration, classrooms engage in rich learning experiences about Matariki. Here are some examples of things tamariki have done in the past:
  - Learning about the stars: Students explore the meaning of each of the nine stars in the Matariki cluster (e.g. Tupuaanuku for food from the ground, Waitī for fresh water, Hiwa-i-te-Rangi for wishes).
  - Art and Craft: Creating Matariki-themed artwork, such as star constellations, weaving, or manu tukutuku (kites), which traditionally carry messages to the stars.
  - Traditional Games (Taakaro): Learning and playing traditional Maaori games like Ki-o-Rahi or Koorari (flax flower games).
  - **Kai Preparation:** Exploring traditional Māori foods and sometimes preparing simple shared snacks or dishes.
  - Reflection and Goal Setting: Students are encouraged to reflect on the past year and set aspirations (hopes and dreams) for the new year, aligning with the Hiwa-i-te-Rangi star.

### 5. Family Engagement:

• We actively encourage whaanau to participate in all aspects of our Matariki celebrations, from the dawn hikoi to the breakfast and assembly. Communication about event timings and the meaning behind our activities is shared widely through newsletters and our school website.



# **Bikes on footpaths**

Do we want five year olds riding on the road while e scooters are zooming around on the footpath?

Are our juniors criminals who are breaking the law every time they ride their bikes?

The law about bikes on footpaths needs to be changed.

At the moment the law only talks about the size of the wheels on bikes and scooters and doesn't consider the age or ability of the rider *Did you know that the road code says "it is illegal to ride a cycle on the footpath unless you're delivering mail or the cycle has very small wheels with a diameter of 355mm or less"? That means that even the bikes our juniors are riding, can't be ridden on the footpath, while e scooters can be.* 

Roads are a dangerous place for little kids. Cars won't see them, especially if there is lots of traffic. Little kids don't have the same balance as older people, some might even still need training wheels. Little kids don't always recognise dangerous situations and they can't judge the speed of cars. If the law says they aren't allowed to ride on the footpaths, where else are they supposed to ride?

Most e scooters in New Zealand can travel at 25 kilometers per hour. Some can go up to 35 kilometers per hour and they are allowed on the footpath. That is way too fast. Old people may be walking on the footpath and might not be able to get out of the way in time. Do we want old people to get knocked over, just because the law says they have to share the footpath with e scooters zooming around them while little kids are forced to ride in traffic?

We think the law needs to be changed so little kids can ride safely on the footpath instead of being put in danger on the roads and fast e scooters should have better rules about where they can ride.




# Lucky book club is open Last day to order This Friday 6 June


